Six members of the public attended

Ray Warburton welcomed everyone to the session and introductions were made. Ray invited questions from the members of the public.

Question 1

Please could you explain the link between the Adult Integrated Care Programme and the Lewisham's devolution pilot and the possible 'flexibilities' that the Devolution pilot may offer?

CCG Response

Martin Wilkinson explained that Lewisham has expressed an interest in being a pilot as part of devolution to London and the next stage was the development of a case for change/business case. The case would explore the potential opportunities that may be available to accelerate the transformation in the way care is delivered, as set out within the Adult Integrated Care Programme, in the following three areas:

- *Estates*
- *Workforce models and enhanced roles*
- *Commissioning and contracting incentives*

The pilot was to test what might be possible with devolved powers over time from national bodies (timetable subject to case and negotiation with the national bodies)

to support wider thinking across London as devolution was at the London rather than local level

Nigel Bowness added that it was the current Government's policy to devolve Central Government powers to Local Government

Martin Wilkinson clarified that the CCG had signed up to the London Health and Care Collaborative agreement, along with the other London CCGs, as one of the London partners.

Question 2

The availability of the Transformation Funds has been mentioned in the press. How does this relate to the Devolution pilot?

CCG Response

Martin Wilkinson explained that the CCG's Expression of Interest did not include a specific request for additional funding from the Transformation Fund; this would be considered as part of developing the case for change/business case. Also there were other 'calls' on the Sustainability and Transformation Fund including the Vanguard sites and delivering the Five Year Forward View's new models of care.

It was noted that the learning from the Manchester integration scheme should be considered.

Question 3

Do Lewisham and Greenwich Trust have the same type of 'platinum' meetings as King College Hospital to review long stay patients and to improve the interface with the different organisations and agencies which support the effective discharge of patients?

Martin Wilkinson confirmed that there were similar processes for Lewisham and Greenwich Trust as part of the System Resilience joint working across agencies. Also he was meeting the Director of Integrated Care and Partnerships at King's, to discuss further the reasons behind the high numbers of long stay Lewisham residents at King's College Hospital.

Question 4

As it is a legal requirement to integrate Health and Care, as part of the Care Act 2014, how will you measure success and how will you put in place mitigating actions if it is not successful?

Martin Wilkinson responding by stating that there were high level national measures of success, as set out in the Better Care Fund metric/performance framework. Against these success measures the CCG, like many other CCG's was not achieving

the reduction in emergency admissions it had planned. However there had been improvements in care for the Individual. This was a good question and the questioner was encouraged to raise it again at the Governing Body meeting under the update item on the Adult Integration programme.

The meeting was informed that the Lewisham's Pensioners' forum current premises in the Saville Centre was under threat of being sold off by the Council.
